Inclusive Higher Education vs. Disability Services

- All schools offer disability services, not all offer inclusive services
 - You might not always know what is right for a student
- Helpful hints
 - Intellectual or developmental disability
 - Not accepted via traditional means
 - Needs support in various domains (social, career, academic, etc.)
 - Modifications vs. accommodations

Accommodations

- Extra time
- Speech to text device
- Special seating assignment
- Frequent breaks

Modifications

- Shorter reading assignment
- Length of paper
- Alternate assessments

Relevant Legislation

- 2008 Federal Higher Education Opportunity Act Reauthorization
 - Authorizes demonstration program for inclusive higher education
 - Establishes national coordinating center (Think College)
- Colorado Senate Bill 196: Inclusive Higher Education Act of 2016
 - Collaborative effort between IN!, The Arc of Colorado, JFK Partners, Senators Bill Cadman & John Cooke, Reps. Dave Young & Lois Landgraf



Inclusive Higher Education

- 100% supported by the institution
- Students with intellectual disabilities are included in academic classes and social activities on college campuses with students without disabilities
 - In other words, students have full access to the school
- Students enjoy all the rights and responsibilities afforded any other student
- Students receive individualized modifications and accommodations

- Increased job diversity

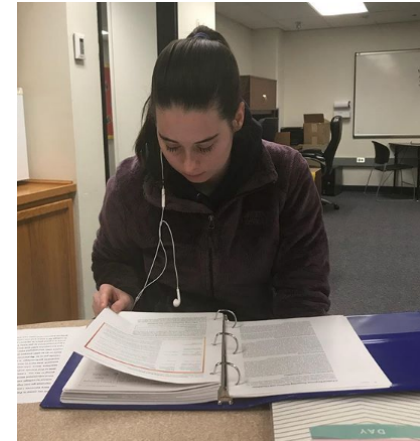


Admission

- Have completed high school (no SAT / ACT required)
- Have a documented intellectual or developmental disability
- Be able to participate in class and campus activities with support
- Desire to go to college
- Express an interest to live and work as independently as possible

Overview

- Academics
 - 3 classes per semester
 - 1 class designed for students with intellectual disabilities
- Social
 - Peer mentors
 - Join campus activities

Overview

- Career
 - Job coaching
 - Internships
- Completion
 - Earn a nationally recognized credential
 - Students leave college prepared for employment



Housing Options

- Arapahoe Community College
 - No on-campus housing
- University of Northern Colorado
 - Dorm living
 - Support provided by resident assistant and residence life peer mentors
- University of Colorado at Colorado Springs
 - On campus apartments
 - Some students use the Supported Living Services waiver for outside support

Financial Information

- Tuition and fees
- Program fee for inclusive services (UNC and UCCS)
- Room and board, if applicable
- Funding options
 - DVR
 - Scholarships
 - College funds/ABLE accounts
 - Financial aid coming

Preparing for College

Individualized Education Programs

- Include the student as the IEP leader to develop choice making and self-determination
- Educate IEP participants on the college options available
- Utilize Think College resources for IEP goal development
- Note: Students with IDD tend to have the fewest postsecondary goals in their transition plans

Inclusion as College Preparation



Early inclusion is an important component of transitioning students to inclusive communities when they finish k-12 schooling

Preparing for Higher Education

- Encourage students to dream!
 - Many students with disabilities are never asked if they want to go to college
- Discuss the student's disability
- Prepare for independence
 - Self-advocacy, learning from failure, self-care, decision making



Skills for Higher Education

- Work on:
 - Communication skills
 - Coordinating a schedule
 - Navigating and travel
 - Managing money transactions
 - Developing healthy habits
 - Safety and appropriate behavior

Finding the Right College

All students need to think about factors such as the size of the college, its location, and whether or not to live on campus or at home.

- Considerations:
 - Is there a counselor at the high school that meets with other students to discuss college options?
 - Are there college visits or fairs in which students with disabilities are not included?
